This template can be used for multiple purposes:

- It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium
- It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium
- It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated <u>Primary PE and sport premium guidance</u>.

The Primary PE and sport premium guidance, outlines 5 key priorities that funding should be used towards. It is not



necessary that spending has to meet all the key priorities, you should select the priorities that you aim to use any funding towards.

Although completing this template is not a requirement for schools, schools are required to publish details of how they spend this funding. Schools must also outline what the impact this funding has had on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment and how any spending will be sustainable in the future. **All funding must be spent by 31st July 2024.**

The Department for Education has worked closely with the Association for Physical Education (afPE) and the Youth Sport Trust (YST) to develop this template and encourages schools to use it. This template is an effective way of meeting the reporting requirements of the Primary PE and sport premium.

Meeting National Curriculum requirements for swimming and water safety.

Priority should always be given to ensuring that pupils can perform safe self-rescue even if they do not fully meet the first two requirements of the National Curriculum programme of study

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	88%	Curriculum swim took place in June 2023. The Y6 cohort was 66 children in June. 66 children took part. 58 children finished at NC KS2 All children were given vouchers for five free family swims by the Plymouth Life Centre to encourage them to continue swimming.

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	88%	We are unable to provide this data as the swimming sessions focused on the NC requirement to swim 25m independently and the provider did not record information on the effectiveness of each of the three main strokes. The provider has a focus on front crawl/backstroke and include diving lessons if children are proficient at NC requirement.



What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	88%	100% of the children who took part. (66) All children have an understanding of self-rescue and practiced techniques, as well as taking part in some taster diving sessions.

Have you done this?	No	This year we will continue our focus to bring the swimming year down to Y4. Y5 and Y4 will be swimming this year in Term 5 – see above data. Once Y4 swimming is established, we plan to use the Sports Premium to provide additional top-up sessions to disadvantaged children. Striving to have more children able to pass the NC expectation at a younger age.
Have you provided CPD to improve the knowledge and confidence of staff to be able to teach swimming and water safety?	No	The school does not have its own pool so has outsourced the service (Plymouth Life Centre). Teachers can gain CPD by watching the swimming coaches teach the lessons/water safety.
